This is the traditional territory of the **Attawandaron** (Neutral Confederacy), **Anishinaabeg** (Ojibway, Mississauga, Chippewa, and Algonquin), and Haudenosaunee Confederacy (Six Nations including the Mohawk, Cayuga, Onondaga, Seneca, Oneida, and Tuscarora Nations).

We honour that these Nations of people have been living on, working on, and caring for this place from time immemorial and continue to do so today.

There are dark pieces of Canadian history, but the colonial genocide that continues to affect Indigenous peoples across these lands is a very dark reality of our present, and it is too often brushed over or ignored completely. We need to be aware of these realities whether we have been here for generations or are newcomers to this country.

We invite you to check out the **resource page on our website** where we continue to provide resources of all kinds, including the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Report. We encourage our followers, community members, and patrons to take a moment and truly reflect on your own knowledge of Canada's historic and ongoing genocide of Indigenous peoples, the continued erasure of Indigenous issues, and how we can truly move forward into reconciliation by listening to the needs of Indigenous peoples across Turtle Island.

To our Indigenous colleagues, friends, and community members – our hearts go out to you. We cannot possibly begin to understand the grief and emotion you are experiencing during this time. We hear you, we see you, and we will continue to stand with you and offer our help in carrying the load so that you never have to do so alone.

HOW DO WE BEGIN AGAIN?

TIME TO COME TOGETHER & HEAL...

Our theatre was always a form of resistance and activism, but two years ago, I realized that the louder our voices became, the more colonial structures were being imposed on us. We were at risk of compromising our values in order to meet the expectations of the systems that surround us.

In 2020, we began the process of dismantling and rebuilding MT Space – and shortly after we cancelled our programming and shut our doors as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. While we continued on the journey of rebuilding ourselves, the world started to hear what racialized communities had been talking about for decades. For the first time, I started to wonder if things would actually change.

This IMPACT 21 we continue on this journey while pushing the conversation forward. We ask our community to show up so the world continues to listen. We invite you to support us as we literally and figuratively build up the structures and systems that work for us – all of us. Let's bring these conversations out into the open and center lived experiences, sitting together in fearless discomfort.

Let's put our money where our mouth is and engage and support racialized artists on stage and in leadership roles. Let's come together and heal.

The festival this year brings work from around the world and across Turtle Island by artists I admire and consider my dear colleagues. I am honoured to present to you a roster of resilience and invite you to come back to IMPACT!



COVID19 FESTIVAL POLICIES

THEATRE IS BACK. THEATRE IS HERE.

MT Space is thrilled to be bringing you live performance, in-person, after a challenging year and a half. To make IMPACT possible, we have re-imagined this year's festival from top to bottom – moving venues outdoors, reducing capacity, and streaming performances online.

WHAT WE'RE DOING TO KEEP YOU SAFE

- All in-person venues will be outdoors, including an inflatable movie screen and a specially constructed theatre tent in Victoria Park!
- Almost all in-person performances will be livestreamed online for viewing in private
- IMPACT staff and artists will undergo regular COVID-19 rapid testing during festival
- All venues have reduced capacity below Stage 3 restrictions to help with distancing
- Created a comprehensive COVID Safety Plan, hired a dedicated COVID Coordinator
- Sanitizing all chairs, equipment and surfaces after each performance
- Screening all artists, staff, crew, volunteers and patrons daily before entering festival venues

FAST FACTS:

- Over 150 COVID-19 rapid tests will be administered throughout IMPACT 21!
- All mainstage venues will have a maximum capacity of 50 audience members
- There will be a total of 40 live events over 2 weeks
- Performances will be broadcast from Chile, Tunisia, Australia, India, Lebanon and across Waterloo Region!

WHAT WE ASK OF YOU

BEFORE YOU ARRIVE

As we work on a return to theatre that is as safe as possible, we ask you to help us out – so that we can reopen without turning back!

If you or anyone in your household is experiencing the following, we ask that you DO NOT attend any IN-PERSON IMPACT 21 events:

- Any COVID-19 symptoms, such as: fever and/or chills, coughing, shortness of breath, decrease or loss of taste or smell, muscle aches/joint pain, extreme fatigue
- Have been told to quarantine or isolate (stay at home) by a doctor, health care provider, public health unit or by federal quarantine requirement (due to travel) within the last 14 days
- Have been identified as a 'close contact' of someone who currently has COVID-19, including via the COVID alert app
- Have tested positive for COVID-19 (any form of test) or are currently waiting on COVID-19 test results
- Live with someone who is currently experiencing any new COVID-19 symptoms and/ or waiting for test results after experiencing symptoms

There will be COVID-19 screening and contact tracing at all of our in-person venues to confirm that our audiences are not experiencing any of the above.

If you cannot attend an in-person IMPACT performance that you have tickets for due to any of the situations outlined above, please contact our box office at **tickets@mtspace.ca** or **519-585-7763** to change your tickets to a livestreamed performance you can watch at home.

WHEN YOU ARE HERE

If you will be joining us in person at IMPACT 21, we ask that you:

- Wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth at all times (including during performances)
- Participate in COVID-screening and contact tracing
- Follow directions from our ushers to enter and exit shows
- Have the COVID Alert app activated on your smartphone
- Follow public health guidelines at all times

While IMPACT 21 will be a little different this year, we look forward to welcoming you back to the theatre and putting the stories that matter centerstage. Thank you for being with us on this journey!

A funeral is transformed into a pagan celebration, a coffin becomes a portal which brings forth the voices of Atahualpa and Jemanya, and the rituals of the Yawar and shrines to the dead are put on display in this rustic opera. Physical theater and contemporary circus mix and meld, breathing life into a series of dreamlike landscapes through the use of object manipulation, poetic imagery, and live music.

A Latin America under construction is presented in this dynamic production that speaks to us about the tension that exists between our memory of the past and our experience of the present, raising the questions: How much of that past have we lost? How much of it lives within us in the present? Is it possible to reconnect with that past?

About the Company

La Patogallina is a street theatre company born in 1996 with their experimental project *A Sangre e Pato*. As a result of this first project, they were invited to Argentina to the First International Conference of Street Theater and Circus Arts where they experienced a fascinating and fertile independent street art movement that became a fundamental moment in the company's development.

Ever since these fruitful and successful beginnings, the company has worked incessantly on new projects and creative processes. To date, after 20 years of activity and dedication, the company accounts for a broad catalogue of original productions.

Currently, La Patogallina is composed of 16 members, among which are actors, musicians, producers and other members of diverse artistic backgrounds.

Following a national uprising that led to the dismantling of one system and the establishment of another in Tunisia, *Mobs (or Exercises in Citizenship)* analyzes the friction between honouring and respecting homeland and participating in society as an upstanding citizen.

About the Creator

Imed May is the author of several dramatic works including *Barshman*, *Al* – *Rahut*, *les sans-visages*, and *Mobs (or Exercises in Citizenship)*. The latter was presented at various festivals, notably the 10th session of the Arab Theater Festival and the 19th session of the Carthage Theater Days in Tunisia where it won the Najeeba Al-Hamrouni Prize.

His complete works were also awarded in Jordan at the 25th session of the Journées du Théâtre. Currently, Imed May is working as a teacher of educational theatre. Holder of a doctorate, he also conducts research in philosophy and theatre.

Moogahlin Performing Arts | Australia

SEP 30, OCT 5 & 8 | 70 MIN CITY HALL – WILLIAM ST PARKING LOT, WATERLOO & ONLINE Lara, a Sydney mum working interstate as a dancer, receives a distress call from her youngest son. Dad hasn't been seen for days and they are running out of food. Lara has only the weekend to traverse the world of high-rise public housing, drug dealing, and addiction to track him down.

And if she succeeds, what will she find?

The Weekend is a rollercoaster ride into one woman's nightmare scenario, one from which she emerges a little wiser about the world and herself. Dancer-turnedplaywright Henrietta Baird's one-woman play blends laughter, hope, love, and loss into a young family's search for a new beginning.

The Weekend was first developed at Yellamundie Festival 2017, had its world premiere with Moogahlin Performing Arts at Carriageworks as part of the 2019 Sydney Festival, and subsequently presented at BATS Theatre in Wellington for the Kia Mau Festival.

About the Company

Moogahlin Performing Arts was formed on Gadigal country in Redfern N.S.W in November 2007, by a group of First Peoples performance artists, educators and community workers.

Bunuba man Frederick Copperwaite, Murriwarri woman Lily Shearer, and Biripai woman Liza-Mare Syron established the company at the request of the late Kevin Smith who wished to bring performing arts back to the community of Redfern, in honour of the founding members of the National Black Theatre.

Moogahlin Performing Arts was incorporated in 2009, with Redfern Community Centre and Gadigal Information Service hosting them until they became a resident company of Carriageworks in 2014. In 2015 the Co-Founders stepped down from the Board to become Co-Artistic Directors, and joined Yorta Yorta theatre maker Andrea James from 2015 – 2016 to form a peer-based Artistic Directorship model utilizing cultural principles to provide a supportive, yet critical and interrogative framework for the discussion and development of new work.

Moogahlin's first production was the third instalment of the PACT led project *Gathering Ground* in 2010 at the Block in Redfern Sydney, a community performance development project. Since that time the program has grown to include three key festivals, the Yellamundie National First Peoples Storytelling Festival, Baiame's Nguungu Festival in Brewarrina, and Koori Gras with the Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras, as well as several new work developments and artist and sector development initiatives.

A poet disappears abruptly, leaving his world haunted. This world has no fringe—its towers, minarets, tunnels and rooms lead one into the other endlessly. In there, we meet a weaver, a prosecutor, a daughter, a publisher, a bereaved student, and several more characters, all of whom tell us about the vanished poet and unravel the mystery behind his disappearance. In this maddening world of desire, rumour, and regret, the poet's poems appear as phantom notes that speak truth to power, and we wonder: Can a poet change the world? Will they let him?

Like a flaneur gliding through a virtualtentacular city, the audience navigates this world on internet-enabled devices.

While watching the show, we might choose to step into a floating room, stay back and listen, or travel to another one. *The Last Poet* is an online interactive performance that brings together theatre, film, sound art, creative coding, and digital scenography. It is India's first theatre-forthe-internet.

About the Creator

Amitesh Grover (b.1980) is an awardwinning interdisciplinary artist. He moves beyond theatre into installation, digital and text-based art. His work delves into themes like the dyad of absence/presence, staging abandonment, the necessity of remembering, the performance of resistance to keep on living, and how to embody unsayable knowledge. He is the recipient of several international grants and artist residencies, and his work is shown globally in theatres, galleries, public spaces, and on the internet. He also teaches and curates for performance and is based in New Delhi, India.

OMI MOUNA

OR, MY FANTASTIC ENCOUNTER WITH MY GREAT GRANDMOTHER

Mohsen El Gharbi | Tiohtià:ke (Montréal) translated by Leanna Brodie

OCT 1, 2 & 3 | 80 MIN VICTORIA PARK TENT, KITCHENER & ONLINE Inspired by real life events, *Omi Mouna* is a tragicomic play that the actor, Mohsen El Gharbi, improvises every evening.

A man investigates the source of the violence he suffered as a child. Dominated by a fear of having inherited his father's brutality, Mohsen goes to Tunisia to film his great-grandmother, Omi Mouna, and retrace the history of her family.

He finds himself thrown back to when she was a young girl, martyred by a tyrannical husband. Mohsen then becomes an invisible witness of dramatic events.

Inspired by fragments of memories, Mohsen, like an archaeologist, reconstructs the significant events in the life of Omi Mouna and discovers a long history of women's resilience and struggle. The monodrama unfolds on a bare stage, where the actor, by his acting alone, manages to resuscitate a whole world. This story comes to us with humour, self-mockery, and tenderness. Mohsen El Gharbi, playing a multitude of characters, immerses us in a fantastic and funny world that can also hurt. Omi Mouna is a poetic mural that tries to understand the violence that perpetuates in the world.

About the Creator

Mohsen El Gharbi is an author, actor and director born in Antwerp by a Flemish mother and a Tunisian father. Mohsen is a graduate of the LASSAAD International Theatre School (Jacques Lecoq pedagogy, Brussels). He refined his training with Ariane Mouchkine, Dario Fo, Yoshi Oida. He has been living in Montreal since 1997.

He is the author of five solos, Omi Mouna, Once upon a time... Omi Mouna, The Last Role, Just for Die - Monologue of a Failed Kamikaze! and most recently Omi Mouna or My Fantastic Encounter With My Great-Grandmother.

He has participated in several theatre productions, including Trois (Mani Soleymanlou), L'énigme Camus - une passion algérienne (Jean-Marie Papapietro), The Poster (Arianna Bardesono), Mr. Goldberg Goes To Tel Aviv (Guy Spring), L'orangeraie (Claude Poissant), Là où le sang se mêle (Charles Bender).

In 2016, he directed his first short film, *The* secret of Omi Mouna, selected in several festivals. He will perform Omi Mouna at the IMPACT 21 Festival in English. This will be the first time he performs one of his solo shows in English after having already performed in Dutch. The Montreal Englishlanguage premiere will be produced by Infinithéâtre in November 2021 and will be co-directed by Zach Fraser.








THIS IS NOT A CONVERSATION

The shift to questions about Canada is profoundly unsettling – as an outsider to the central conflict between Israel and Palestine, it is definitely easier to sit in judgement, or ignorance, but when people who have immigrated begin to avow their status as settlers, and recognize Canada as a colonial power, the focus crystallizes.

The Elbow Theatre Vancouver OCT 2, 5 & 8 | 60 MIN ONLINE READING & DISCUSSION

This is Not a Conversation: a performance in words and actions about guilt, memory, identity, and the nature of responsibility.

Dima's father is a Palestinian from Jerusalem, where she is not allowed to visit. Itai is an Israeli from Jerusalem, who was a soldier in Palestine. Both are natural storytellers and improvisers. Both are very passionate about the conflict. What happens when you put them on stage together? This is not a conversation.

The situation in Palestine and Israel has become the quintessentially unresolvable conflict of our time. Successive generations and governments have discussed, negotiated, and fought over an area of land smaller than Vancouver Island, and home to over twelve million people, and a peaceful solution has never seemed more remote than in the past vear. Itai Erdal was born in Israel and served with the Israeli Army in Lebanon and Palestine. Shortly after he left the army, he decided that he also had to leave Israel, and in 1999 he came to Canada. Dima Alansari is a grandchild of Palestinians exiled from Jerusalem during the 1948 forced exodus. She has never been allowed to visit Palestine. In 2013 Itai and Dima met at a dinner party in Vancouver.

Developed with director Ker Wells, a first draft workshop production was invited to the 2015 IMPACT Festival in Kitchener, and the show premiered at the 2017 Spark Festival in Victoria.

Dedicated to the loving memory of our late director Ker Wells.

About the Company

The Elbow Theatre was founded in 2012 by Itai Erdal with the purpose of creating and producing thought-provoking theatre about political and social subject matters.

The Elbow's past projects include:

White Rabbit / Red Rabbit by Nassim Soleimanpour; Flee by David Hudgins, a co-production between The Elbow, The Electric Company, Studio 58 and Barking Sphinx; A Very Narrow Bridge by Itai Erdal, Anita Rochon and Maiko Yamamoto; Hyperlink by Itai Erdal and TJ Dawe, directed by Rachel Peake.

This Is Not A Conversation by Dima Alansari and Itai Erdal, directed by Ker Wells, has received funding from the BC Arts Council, The City of Vancouver, and the Canada Council for the Arts. A version of the show premiered at the North American Culture Lab in upstate New York in May 2016, and its official world premiere was presented by the Belfry Theatre in Victoria at the 2017 SPARK Festival. It was extremely well received by audiences and critics alike. The Elbow is in talks with national and international presenters about touring the show.

SEP 29 & 30 | 60 MIN VICTORIA PARK TENT, KITCHENER & ONLINE On a creative hiatus for the past two years, MT Space began work on our new creation this summer. This new piece began as the third installation of an informal trilogy including previous productions, *The Last 15 Seconds* and *AMAL* - both of which are still touring internationally.

An attempt to recognize how much has changed since creating shows that delve into issues of terrorism, extremism, and occupation—this new work was going to explore the roles that Canada and the United States play in perpetuating extremism.

Now, two years later, theatre as a livelihood has taken on a whole new meaning for many artists within our own communities.

Our stories are a form of resistance.

Before pouring our hearts and our emotions into this new work, we took some time and space to be together – to mourn, to sit in our heaviness, to acknowledge that we didn't come out of the past two years okay, but we did arrive here still standing.

What began as a work exploring the ideas of extremism quickly evolved into a piece that centers women and our endurance, injustices committed against us, and what pushes us towards our own tipping points.

About the Company

MT Space was founded upon the value of centralizing marginalized and racialized artists and stories, filling what seemed to be a great void in a community of many different peoples. MT Space was founded in 2004 by Lebanese-Canadian Majdi Bou-Matar, who is a trained director, actor, and dancer. Majdi relocated to Canada when his wife was accepted to University of Waterloo to pursue a PhD. Thinking that Majdi would continue his career in Canada as a multi-talented artist, he auditioned with various theatre companies in Southern Ontario. After receiving the same criticism over and over, hearing that his accent was too thick or that he "didn't look the part", Majdi decided to create a company that would become a platform for all artists that felt marginalized, racialized, and displaced.

This is how MT Space was born.

The GOAT Collective, an intercultural team of senior artists and friends Nina Lee Aquino, Majdi Bou-Matar, and Ric Knowles, was formed for this production as a model of intercultural communication and cooperation.

With a string of firsts in Asian Canadian theatre, Nina Lee Aquino was the founding Artistic Director of fu-GEN Asian Canadian theatre company, organized the first Asian Canadian theatre conference, edited the first (2-volume) Asian Canadian play anthology, and co-edited the first (awardwinning) book on Asian Canadian theatre. She became Artistic Director of Cahoots Theatre and currently holds the same position at Factory Theatre. Awards for her work include the Ken McDougall Award 2004, the Canada Council John Hirsch Prize 2008, the Toronto Arts Foundation's Margo Bindhart and Rita Davies Cultural Leadership Award, the Toronto Theatre Critics Award for Best Director, and three Dora Mavor Moore Awards for Outstanding Direction.

Ric Knowles has worked for over forty years as a director and dramaturge at theatres ranging from Mulgrave Road to the Stratford Festival, most recently specializing in facilitating intercultural performance practice. He is University Professor Emeritus at the University of Guelph, former editor of Theatre Journal, Modern Drama, and Canadian Theatre Review, and award-winning author or editor of over twenty books on theatre and performance.

Majdi Bou-Matar was the Founding Artistic Director of both MT Space and IMPACT Festival. He has directed and acted in productions in Beirut, Tunisia, Toronto, Vancouver, and Whitehorse, and his productions at MT Space have included *Seasons of Immigration, Yes or NO!, Exit Strategy*, and the widely touring and highly acclaimed *Body 13, AMAL, The Raft*, and *The Last 15 Seconds*, the last of which has toured within Canada and throughout the Middle East for over a decade.



Winner of an emerging artist award at Arts Awards Waterloo Region (2019) and the Best Actor Award at the Central Theatre Festival in Syria (2008), he directed lonesco's The Lesson in Egypt and won Best Director Award for directing Chekhov's The Bear at Cairo's Festival of International Theatre (2013). Ahmad came to Canada as a refugee in 2016 and currently lives in Kitchener, ON, where he works with MT Space as an artistic associate, facilitator and co-director of their Young Company. This piece is part of a three-part series of one-woman shows that explore the mental, emotional, physical and spiritual imbalances of oncoming motherhood and themes of young Black motherhood and the cyclical and familial trauma that motherhood can encompass. Over the span of ten moons, the audience follows the protagonist through the decisionmaking process of whether she should follow in her biological mother's footsteps or forge a path of her own.

About the Company

Virtu Arts was founded in 2020 at the height of the COVID-19 global pandemic. We began as a production company that set out to create a virtual space to tell stories through live performance. As the pandemic continued, and we were forced to settle into a new normal, we pivoted and are now a community arts organization that focuses on creating virtual space to educate, develop, and share Black/African/ Caribbean diasporic creators and their stories with the world.

With our creative streams, we nurture artists through every step of their creative process by offering skill-building workshops facilitated by influential artists, one-person play development programs, and by producing live performances.

DANCERS-IN-RESIDENCE AT MT SPACE:

Raven Morand & Kate Kamo McHugh Waterloo Region





This summer, The National Arts Centre is partnering with more than 30 Canadian artists through a summer artistic residency program called 'Free Rein'—a new threemonth-long initiative in support of the renewal of the Canadian performing arts sector. MT Space is fortunate to be partnering with the NAC Dance Section as a conduit to host two of these artists-inresidence locally.

We are thrilled and honoured to be incubating the work of Raven Morand and Kate Kamo McHugh, who will be creating this August and sharing their journeys at IMPACT 21.

Here's what they look to explore:

OCTOBER 5, 6 & 7 | 30 MIN ! VICTORIA PARK TENT, KITCHENER & ONLINE

Raven Morand: "The goal of this project is to demonstrate the power of healing through dance for Indigenous folks residing on Turtle Island. Since colonization, Indigenous people have had to endure unjust violence which continues to happen to this day. Indigenous folks have also had to display incredible amounts of resilience while also battling intergenerational trauma and cycles of abuse. In recent weeks, the public has become aware of over a thousand unmarked graves of Indigenous children at a handful of residential schools in the colonial state of Canada, With hundreds more of residential schools to be searched. that number is sure to climb.

For many of us, dancing is what feeds our spirits, how we connect/reconnect with our culture, how we pass down our culture to the next generations to come, and one of our most important healing tools. This project will have three dancers within their own categories explore what healing through dance means to them and dance in honor of all those children who never made it home."



Kate Kamo McHugh: "My project is a solo dance piece called Michiko (working title), an exploration of Japanese Canadian identity-cultural loss, retention and creation. The central question I will be exploring is: Throughout my Japanese family's five generations in Canada, what has been lost culturally and what remains? I will be looking at critical aspects like language, physical appearance, and family names. Michiko is my grandmother's name, my middle name, and the Japanese name I gave to my Gosei (fifth) generation daughter. I cherish this name, like the other Japanese cultural elements that remain in our family. After experiencing ostracization during WWII, families like mine tried to become as Canadian as possible—distancing themselves from all that is Japanese and accelerating this cultural loss. Today, families like mine are proud of their heritage and trying to access the cultural remains of generations past. I first started to think about this piece with the 2019 birth of my daughter, the first member of our family's fifth generation. How would I explain to her why we've lost so much of our Japanese culture? Through this residency, I hope to discover more about my family and peoples' history."

About the Artists

Raven Morand is an Anishinaabe/ Metis Kwe from Thunder Bay. She grew up spending summers in her home community of Migisi Sahgaigan (Eagle Lake First Nation) and moved to Kitchener, Ontario with her family when she was 4. Raven is a dedicated pow wow dancer and has been dancing Fancy Shawl for over a decade. Raven has been the head female dancer at many pow wows and enjoys her culture through dance and beadwork. Raven actively engages with her community through sitting on pow wow committees and attending community events. Raven is an activist and organizer and a strong advocate for Indigenous sovereignty and land defense.

Kate Kamo McHugh is a performing artist and educator from Kitchener. Ontario. Some professional highlights for Kate include dancing for Disney Cruise lines, working in children's theatre in South America, and being part of MT Space's inaugural Arts Exchange. Earlier this vear. Kate was honoured to co-facilitate a movement-based workshop for the Newcomer Youth Program in partnership with MT Space and the YMCA. Kate is currently rehearsing with Cosmic Fishing Theatre and excited to perform for an audience again post-COVID. She holds a BFA from Ryerson University in Theatre Performance Dance.


